Tailored Evidence and Learning Service (TELS)

For the Uganda refugee response

What is TELS?

Do you need a quick summary of the latest evidence from the Uganda refugee response? Do you want to bring key actors together to learn from each other? Or do you need a two-page summary of a critical resource?

The Tailored Evidence and Learning Service (TELS) is a **free service** designed to support cross-sectoral learning and the increased use of evidence and good practices in the Uganda refugee response.

Thematic focus

Support provided through TELS falls under the following thematic areas: *self-reliance*, *climate* & *environment*, *refugee participation*, and *the humanitarian-development nexus*.

Three work streams are prioritised for the April 2023 – March 2024 period: *sustainable livelihoods, energy & localisation.*

How to request services from TELS

TELS is **demand-driven**. Refugee response actors can request services from TELS using the **online application form** available on the U-Learn website through <u>ulearn-uganda.org/tels-request/</u>.

Who can request support from TELS?

All refugee response actors working in Uganda, including:

- National NGOs
- Refugee Led Organisations
- Government actors
- Private sector actors
- INGOs
- UN agencies
- Innovators
- Academics

TELS SERVICES

- Resource curation: Bring together, synthesis and select the most relevant existing knowledge and evidence.
 - Ex. annotated bibliographies, desk reviews and analytical summaries.
- Documenting good practices: Capture and systematically document recent experiences and innovations of key actors from the Ugandan context. Ex. Good practice studies, case studies, discussion papers and deep dives.
- Summaries & Visualisation: Make existing evidence more accessible, considering branding and adding visuals. Ex. Short briefs, fact sheets, infographics, communication style products such as blogs or articles.
- Actors mapping & convening: Bring actors together in face-to-face or on-line events to facilitate peerlearning. Map actors and make the database accessible online to foster connections.

Ex. roundtables, learning consultations, learning discussions, dissemination events. Online visual databases.







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
How will my request be evaluated?

We use the following guiding criteria:

- 1. The request is cross-sectoral in nature.
- 2. The request is in line with the thematic priorities.
- 3. The request benefits the wider refugee response.
- 4. The request responds to clearly identified evidence/learning needs and/or serves a clear objective.

U-Learn is supporting learning and research with and for Ugandan and refugee-led actors. In case of limited resources, we will privilege requests from these actor groups.
