What is U-Learn?

U-Learn is a public good designed to promote improved outcomes for refugees and host communities in Uganda. In collaboration with the Government and a wide range of stakeholders, U-Learn focuses on facilitating learning, conducting assessments, and amplifying refugee voices and priorities. U-Learn specializes in Accountability to Affected Populations (AAP), Research and Learning.



Facilitating cross-sectoral learning and encouraging uptake of key evidence amongst refugee response actors. Conducting in-depth assessments to fill critical knowledge gaps in the refugee response Empowering refugees and host communities to make their voices count at all levels of refugee response planning.

Why U-Learn?

U-Learn supports response-strengthening by responding to three humanitarian challenges that limit quality and effectiveness of self-reliance and humanitarian-development nexus programmes and policies in the Uganda refugee response:

- Lack of accurate, reliable, and unbiased evidence on needs and on programme effectiveness,
- Untapped opportunities to learn from and apply evidence when it is available, and
- Gaps in existing approaches for engaging affected populations.



of refugees and their ability to influence decisions that impact them. Contributions from REF members has allowed issues from refugees to be raised to the national level, examples include issues around access to medicines and lack of ambulances, and the overcrowding of schools. Partners responded by providing more ambulances and construction of new classrooms. Response actors reportedly adjusted their programming based on evidence from the in-depth assessments. Notably, these assessments have influenced the choice of mechanisms for cash assistance delivery for at least three actors. Additionally, one in five perception survey respondents reported using the livelihood assessment to modify their programming. Through curation and synthesis of evidence, and interactive and inclusive conveners, the learning work has led to over 10 connections and adaptations of practices and policies per year since 2022. For instance, following a learning process, the Bank of Uganda recently adopted new harmonised standards for training on Financial Literacy that apply to all refugee response actors. At least 3 NGOs and 3 financial service providers reported using them even before their official launch. These updated standards improve the way people receive trainings, driving quality, and thus contributing to better opportunities for the financial inclusion of refugees and host communities.

How U-Learn works

U-Learn provides services in response to demand from humanitarian stakeholders. Consultative stakeholder engagement and collaborations are foundational: such as for the selection of the 4 themes of work, the design of in-depth assessments, co-facilitation of AAP trainings, or co-hosting conveners. All activities are open to and inclusive of government and non-governmental humanitarian actors, local, refugee led and private sector actors, and academia.



What next?

U-Learn continues to respond to refugee response actors support needs for evidence, learning and AAP. Upcoming work includes topics of climate change and market system development and a focus on sustainability and amplification of the achievements to date through partnerships.
